I See Both Sides - Vocab Cards

antagonize verb

to make an enemy of.

He knew he would *antagonize* the other players if he cheated.

Synonyms: anger, annoy, offend

Antonyms: compliment, pacify

Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

antagonize verb

to oppose (someone).

She liked to *antagonize* her brother in arguments, always taking the opposite side.

Synonyms: oppose, resist



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

apathy noun

lack of interest or feeling.

Rae is filled with so much *apathy*; I don't think she would even care if her best friend moved away forever.

Synonyms: aloofness, indifference

Antonyms: care, concern, passion



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

arbitrate verb

to have someone else settle a disagreement between two parties.

The rival companies had to *arbitrate* their dispute because they couldn't solve the problem themselves.

Synonyms: make a deal, negotiate, settle



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

bestow verb

to give as a gift or award (usually followed by "on").

A ceremony was held so the President could *bestow* an award on the famous scientist.

Synonyms: award, give, grant

Antonyms: deprive



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

bigot noun

one who is prejudiced against and intolerant of any group or belief that is not his or her own, especially religious, racial, or ethnic.

We knew the man was a *bigot* when we heard him make a hateful, intolerant comment.

Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

capsize verb

to turn over; upset.

Don't rock the boat or it will *capsize*!

Synonyms: flip over, overturn, roll over

Antonyms: right



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

compromise noun

a certain type of agreement in which two sides disagree about something in the beginning but come to agree after each side gives up something.

I like chocolate cake and my sister likes yellow cake, so we came to a *compromise* and ordered a yellow cake with chocolate frosting.

Synonyms: tradeoff

Antonyms: disagreement, dispute

Compromise can also be used as a verb, like in this sentence: "She wanted to go to a movie and I wanted to stay home, so we compromised by renting a video."



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

epidemic noun

a rapid spread or growth of some phenomenon.

Cell phone use among teens is sweeping the country like an *epidemic*.

Synonyms: outbreak, upsurge

Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

epidemic noun

an outbreak of disease that spreads rapidly to many people.

The school had an *epidemic* of measles.



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

haggle verb

to bargain or argue over petty differences in price, terms, or point of view.

At the market, people *haggle* over the price of antiques, hoping to get a better price.

Synonyms: bicker, quarrel

Antonyms: agree



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

homicide noun

the act of killing another person; murder.

Now that the shooting victim has died, the suspect is accused of *homicide*.



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

irate adjective

very angry.

My mother was *irate* when I arrived home after ten o'clock.

Synonyms: angry, incensed, indignant

Antonyms: happy



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

permanent adjective

lasting or intended to last forever; not temporary.

Spilling grape juice on my white T-shirt left a *permanent* stain.

Synonyms: fixed

Antonyms: temporary



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

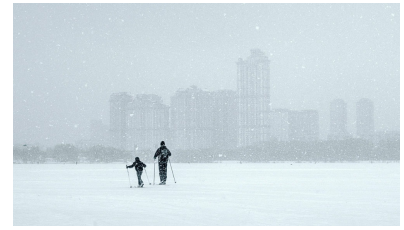
Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

persist verb

to continue or keep doing something in a firm, steady way.

The weather channel says the snow and freezing weather will *persist* for several more weeks.

Synonyms: continue, last



Use this word in a sentence or give an example to show you understand its meaning:

Draw this vocab word or an example of it:

rant verb

to speak or complain loudly and vehemently.

The littlest annoyance will make him *rant* for hours about getting no respect.

Synonyms: declaim, harangue, rave

Rant can also be used as a noun, like in this sentence: "She launched into one of her angry rants about the cost of medical treatment."

wrath noun

fierce anger.

He had to face his sister's *wrath* after crashing her car.

Synonyms: anger, fury, rage

Antonyms: delight, happiness, love
